These works, such as Rachmi Diyah Larasati's *The Dance that Makes You Vanish*, Vincent Monnikendam's *Mother Dao* (1995), and the collaborative films of Nia Dinata, challenge the naturalized methods of seeing that justify exploitation, dehumanization, and early death of people of color. By theorizing the mechanisms of visual biopolitics, Rony elucidates both its violence and its vulnerability.
