This extraordinary book, written during the four months that Daniel Berrigan was resisting arrest and living underground, is an unexpected gift. Rather than being merely an account of a fugitive's life, this is a spiritual work of the highest order, the work of an unusual man brooding over injustice, war, and love and setting forth his vision of what a man can become. His starting point is St. John of the Cross, from whom the author draws the inspiration that informs his unorthodox commentary on *The Dark Night of the Soul*. Here, John is the guru, the master to whom the disciple comes for enlightenment, the one whose vision inspires the disciple as he searches for his own vision. As the commentary moves on, it becomes the instrument by which Father Berrigan extends his own moral commitment to explore and reaffirm his spiritual philosophy, his concern for the world, his intense desire to awaken and move society in a nonviolent way. Essays on a Science of Mythology is a cooperative work between C. Kerényi, who has been called “the most psychological of mythologists,” and C. G. Jung, who has been called “the most mythological of psychologists.” Kerényi contributes an essay on the Divine Child and one on the Kore (the Maiden), together with a substantial introduction and conclusion. Jung contributes a psychological commentary on each essay. Both men hoped, through their collaboration, to elevate the study of mythology to the status of a science. In “The Primordial Child in Primordial Times” Kerényi treats the child-God as an enduring and significant figure in Greek, Norse, Finnish, Etruscan, and Judeo-Christian mythology. He discusses the Kore as Athena, Artemis, Hecate, and Demeter-Persephone, the mother-daughter of the Eleusinian mysteries. Jung speaks of the Divine Child and the Maiden as living psychological realities that provide continuing meaning in people’s lives. The investigations of C. Kerényi are continued in a later study, *Eleusis: Archetypal Image of Mother and Daughter* (Princeton).

This textbook on the United Nations presents primary materials with expert commentary

and demonstrates the interaction between law and practice in the UN organization. The materials also demonstrate the possibilities and limitations of multilateral institutions more generally and thus can be used for courses on the United Nations or International Organizations, taught in both Law and International Relations programs. The book's emphasis on primary materials serves two purposes. First, such materials enable a realistic presentation of the work of international diplomacy as the negotiation and interpretation of such texts is an important part of what actually takes place at the United Nations and other international organizations. Secondly, it is hoped that students will develop the ability to read these texts critically, parsing not only the meaning but the politics behind such documents. Importantly, this second aim includes understanding the different types of material presented in this volume, each of which must be read differently: treaties and resolutions based on political compromises, judicial opinions that are based on legal reasoning, policy documents intended to justify specific actions, advocacy intended to pursue a national or other interest, and so on. Each chapter begins with a short introductory essay by the authors. This describes how the documents that follow illustrate a set of legal, institutional, and political issues relevant to the practice of diplomacy and the development of public international law through the United Nations. Each chapter includes questions that may guide discussion of the primary materials and further readings for additional secondary sources. The book covers the most important aspects of the work of the United Nations "peace and security, development, human rights" but also approaches the questions of global governance thematically, looking at issues of relevance, effectiveness, and accountability.
